

Sixty years ago ...

Collinsville was rocked by the worst mining disaster in its history ... and today we remember those who died, those who risked their lives to help mates and the dangers faced every day by men and women in Australian coal mines.

REPEATED WARNINGS

In the months leading up to the disaster, men working in the Collinsville Coal Mines repeatedly raised concerns about safety conditions and in the weeks preceding, the ever-present "bubbling" of carbon dioxide in accumulated water increased. It was ominous signal for the catastrophic outburst that was to claim the lives of seven men.

THE DAY OF THE DISASTER

On that Wednesday afternoon, the mother of Henry "Pike" Peterson waited on the veranda of her Sonoma Street home for her son to pass on his way to work. She was keen to tell him the good news of a £50 win in the Golden Casket, she didn't manage to catch him and Pike would never claim his prize.

At 5.50pm a gas outburst of almost pure carbon dioxide (almost 98 per cent) occurred in No.1 tunnel at the deepest part of the mine. More than 900 tonnes of coal & stone dislodged & were blown 30 metres up the heading.

Asphyxiation caused the death of all seven men: Alex Parkinson, Peter Miller, Henry Peterson, Frederick Ernest Walker, James Reid Logan, Arthur Shrubsole and Herbert Ruff.

A COMMUNITY IN MOURNING

Miners across the state laid down their tools in solidarity and on the day of the funeral, 2000 people took part in the sombre processions to honour those killed.

THE INQUIRY

Despite the previous repeated warnings of safety concerns, the Government Inquiry later found that "the conduct of the owner, the management or any employer was not a contributing factor" but many labelled the inquiry a "whitewash". Since 1954, four more men have died in the Collinsville Coal Mines taking the total number to 26.

Through the trade union movement, men and women of the coal industry continue to campaign tirelessly for improved safety conditions in Australian mines.

We must never forget the true COST of coal.
